School bullies can scar you for life

The nature of bullying at school is becoming more violent and, unless steps are taken to combat it, schools will become even worse hives of harassment, writes Latoya Newman

John* is in his 40s, the father of one and a working professional, but when he walks past a group of schoolboys he still has an unexplainable fear of them.

"People just do not understand what kind of emotional scars bullying can leave you with," he said.



John was bullied emotionally and physically for many of his school-going years, starting at the age of 11, at the two co-education schools and one boys' high school he attended in KwaZulu-Natal.

"At one school I had to learn all the boys' names, the teachers' names and the teachers' dogs' names. If you did not know them, they (the bullies) would punch you so hard that you would fall down. You pick yourself up and they would punch you again, and again. They called it character-building, but it is soul-destroying," he said.

The man says he was teased "relentlessly" by fellow pupils and he developed a low selfesteem throughout most of his adult years.

"As you grow older, you learn to numb it, but it takes a while. Another challenge as you grow older is the anger. Sometimes when people offend me and try to belittle me, it is tempting to just beat them. But I restrain myself. I have embraced martial arts and it has helped me in some areas ... I was never an aggressive person before," he said.
