

Tombstone music

An epitaph is an inscription that could be written on a gravestone.



As you read these examples, work out what the overall <u>tone</u> of these brief poems is.

Here lies G. Whilliken's friends, all five. He took them along when he learned to drive.

Here lieth the mother of children seven,

Four on earth and three in heaven –

The three in heaven preferring rather

To die with mother than live with father.

Beneath this slah John Brown is stowed. He watched the ads And not the road.

Husband to his Wife on his Death

As I am now so you must be

Therefore prepare to follow me.

The Wife's Epitaph

To follow you I'm not content
How do I know which way you went?

A Child of Seven Months

If I am so quickly done for, What on earth was I begun for?

When Frankenstein's monster finally died, And his reign of terror ceased, These were the words they inscribed on his grave: May the Occupant rust in peace.

You should have noted that although the epitaph is written to put on a grave, these epitaphs are rather humorous! They often mock the person who has died.



Part One: Your voices as musical instruments

In this task, you are going to work in groups to present these epitaphs using your voices as musical instruments.

Using ululation, vocalic lilting, crepitation and mouth drumming, create a mood and atmosphere and then work to a climax in each of these short pieces. You may repeat phrases in order to establish a rhythm effectively.
